President's Report by Cathy Makihara & Craig Natsuhara

The Nikkei National Museum & Cultural Centre's Board of Directors had an eventful year. This past year it set goals for expanded programs at the Nikkei Centre; balancing the budget; and initiating more involvement of the community.

Summarizing 2012, some board history as well. It also served as a model highlights include: for partnership, with the Museum's staff

- 1. achieving a small financial surplus in 2012 and working toward our goal to retire the debt on the line of credit
- 2. reaching \$1M in the Nikkei Place Foundation's Legacy Endowment which in turn will help to bring financial stability to NNMCC
- 3. launching the Garden Benches fundraising program
- 4. developing an active recruitment for Membership
- 5. strengthening the society with active working committees
- 6. playing a leading role in building alliances with other Nikkei community organizations to serve our community

Under the direction of Miko Hoffman, Executive Director, we enjoyed the

ever delightful cultural activities such as Celebrate Spring, Jan Ken Pon and Nikkei Fall Harvest Fair.

The current exhibit at the Museum – *Ryoshi* – covering the history of Nikkei fishermen not only delves into our community's history but our province's history as well. It also served as a model for partnership, with the Museum's staff led by our Director-Curator Beth Carter working closely with the Fishermen's Committee, based in Steveston.

Each room in the Nikkei Centre was actively used; the Special Events Hall acted as a major gathering place with the Nikkei Craft and Bake Sale, Nikkei Place Community Awards Gala, as well as being a place of wellness with martial arts and dance and exercise programs. The various activity rooms were places of outreach with both members of our community and those beyond utilizing the rooms for their activities. Especially noticeable at these large events is the NNMCC Auxiliary, a dedicated group of volunteers who raise funds and then donate it back to NNMCC for projects. Our thanks go to the rentals, programming and facility staff for organizing and facilitating these activities.

The Society has laid plans for 2013, one of which is an ambitious goal to increase its membership by 500. We ask you to ask your family, friends and acquaintances to join this organization. We are confident that they will enjoy the benefits.

We thank for their commitment and work Dan Nomura, Ken Shinozaki and Stephen Kamachi, all who served on the Board in 2012 and are not part of the 2013 slate.

The Board of Directors sincerely thanks you for your help, for your gift, for your support and for your participation in the Nikkei National Museum & Cultural Centre.

COMMUNICATIONS

In 2012 we implemented a re-branding project, based on the NNMCC board's decision to rename the organization from National Nikkei Museum & Heritage Centre (and Japanese Canadian National Museum) to Nikkei National Museum & Cultural Centre (using Nikkei National Museum for museum-specific purposes). In summer of 2012 we launched our new website and made improvements to interior signage as well as to our communications materials (e-news, Nikkei Place Network). Social media initiatives have also increased, with much thanks to our Museum Programmer Nichola Ogiwara.

MUSEUM PROGRAMS

The Nikkei National Museum collects, preserves, interprets and exhibits the heritage of Japanese Canadians. This Museum is the only institution in Canada solely devoted to the history, culture and art of Japanese Canadians.

COLLECTIONS MANAGEMENT

Archives and Artifact Collections - collection, accessions, arrangement and description, loans, conservation, acquisitions committee, oral history interviews. In 2012 the collection team acquired 61 new collections and the overall scope of the collection grew to almost 10,000 items. We scanned over 2700 historic photographs and artefacts and made 141 audio tapes, that are now accessible online by visiting nikkeimuseum. org. We are grateful for assistance from the Irving K Barber BC History Digitization Program and the SFU Library. Thank you especially to our hardworking summer students and volunteers.

Japanese Canadian Museum Collections Community Outreach Project – with assistance from the Vancouver Foundation and the sharing best practices program of the Museum Assistance Program of Canadian Heritage, we were able to expand our partnerships with the Nikkei Internment Memorial Centre in New Denver and the Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre in Toronto to improve their collections databases and documentation systems, and preserve their valuable collections. Several summer students were hired, collections were organized and over 3300 artifacts were documented. You can search the results at www.nikkeimuseum.org.

Research Centre - individual and group research; research by other museums and archives; photograph reproductions; college and university research sessions; collaborative research program. In 2012, we had 150 Research Requests, and collections staff spent 225 hours helping researchers access the collections. With over 3300 visitors, we know that community members are actively using our online database to research Japanese Canadian history. They looked at over 51000 pages online. Our *Lost and Found* blog, showcasing historic photographs from the collection, had over 7500 hits.

EDUCATION PROGRAM

Our dynamic History and Culture programs, under the leadership of Naomi Horii, enable learners from all backgrounds and ages to learn about Japanese Canadian heritage and culture in a challenging and inspiring course of study. The services are provided by our organization or in collaboration with organizations, instructors and school. In 2012 (Jan - Dec), the museum interacted with over 1200 students through Japanese cultural programs, Japanese Canadian history programs, rentals of Journeys kits, and several outreach presentations. The program is assisted by 46 active volunteers, who contributed over 500 hours to share their skill and knowledge with the students.
