Who we are

The Nikkei National Museum & Cultural Centre (NNMCC) is located on the traditional, ancestral, and unceded territories of the Coast Salish Peoples; and in particular, the x*mə\textit{\textit{k}}\textit{w}\textit{y}\textit{\textit{d}}\textit{m} Musqueam, S\textit{k}\textit{w}\textit{w}\textit{w}\textit{d}\textit{m} MCC's mission is to honour, preserve, and share the history and heritage of Japanese Canadians and Japanese culture in Canada. The NNMCC's mandate is to promote a better understanding and appreciation by all Canadians of Japanese Canadian culture and heritage; and awareness by all Canadians of the contribution of Japanese Canadians to Canadian society, through exhibits, programs, services, publications, public use of the facilities, and special events.

Job description

The Museum Intern, with direction from the Design & Exhibit Coordinator, will assist with museum gallery and museum shop operations. They will participate in outreach events that share Japanese Canadian history and culture with the public, and support staff in preparing for the NNMCC's annual summer Japanese culture festival Nikkei Matsuri. The Museum Intern will be immersed in the workings of a small, community-based, culturally significant non-profit heritage institution and collaborate with museum programmers and event staff.

What you'll do (duties):

- Assist in the installation and de-installation of museum gallery exhibits
- Complete incoming and outgoing condition reporting for artwork and exhibit materials
- Assist in overseeing the upkeep and maintenance of two museum gallery exhibits including contemporary textile artist Setsuko Piroche's exhibit WOVEN and Haq and



History: the Punjabi Canadian Legacy Project, a travelling exhibit created by the South Asian Studies Institute at the University of the Fraser Valley

- Create a marketing calendar structured around important outreach and in-house events
 that includes a scheduled weekly email newsletters and social media communications
 for the museum shop. Prepare marketing materials for our annual member's week sale
 following the NNMCC brand guidelines.
- Assist in preparing shop items for outreach events and oversee shop inventory during the events
- Update and maintain the online shop inventory
- Assist in the research, development, and production of new NNMCC shop merchandise
- Complete museum shop consignment inventory reports
- Assist in preparation for Nikkei Matsuri, including sign making, marketing and website updates
- Provide boots on the ground support at cultural events including the Nikkei Garden
 Farmer's Market, Powell Street Festival, and Nikkei Matsuri
- Support reception staff by cover two lunch breaks per week. This will include handling
 museum shop sales, answering public inquiries in person and on the phone, and
 providing customer service to visitors

What you'll gain (learning objectives):

- Experience working in a culturally diverse and dynamic collaborative environment within a mid-sized organization
- Familiarity with Japanese Canadian contemporary artists
- Familiarity with Japanese and Japanese Canadian history and culture
- Experience assisting in the coordination of the installation, de-installation and upkeep of 2 public gallery exhibits
- Organizational skills
- Website skills on platforms Wordpress and Shopify
- Skills in managing a variety of daily, weekly, monthly, and longer tasks/projects and deadlines
- Appreciation of cultural complexities and the importance of cultural sensitivity
- Learn about the intersectionality of Japanese Canadians and other cultural groups in Canada

Who you are (qualifications):

Candidates will be chosen on the basis of their skill level and ability, therefore we welcome all applicants regardless of race, gender, or disability. We invite individuals who reflect the diversity



of our visitors to apply. In accordance with the British Columbia Accessibility Act a request for accommodation will be considered throughout the hiring process.

Graduates in the field of museum studies, curatorial studies, history, anthropology, art administration, Asian Canadian and Asian migration studies, and other fields are encouraged to apply. The NNMCC welcomes graduates from interdisciplinary backgrounds.

Applicants must be organized and detail-oriented, flexible and willing to multitask, work well both independently and collaboratively, be able to meet agreed-upon goals and deadlines, and will perform other related duties as required. Applicants must be fluent in English.

- Experience with Shopify, Facebook, Instagram, Twitter is an asset.
- Project management experience is an asset.
- Knowledge of Canadian History/Japanese Canadian History is an asset.

- Are legally entitled to work in Canada.
- Are between 16 and 30 years of age at the start of employment.
- Are willing to commit to the full duration of the work assignment.
- Will not have another full-time job (over 30 hours a week) while employed.
- Are unemployed or underemployed.
- Are a college or university graduate.
- Are not receiving Employment Insurance (EI) benefits while employed.

Location
