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Executive Director's Message

It has been another landmark year at the NNMCC, as outlined in the annual report. Without being too redundant, I would like to highlight a few activities, initiatives and significant changes that took place at the NNMCC in the last fiscal year.

In May, we hosted the unveiling of the Mitsuo & Emmie Hayashi Hall, with their niece Kayoko Ihara from Japan, Consul General Kohei Maruyama, and many local friends, to recognize their dedication and impactful legacy at the NNMCC. In October, we gathered with Michael Cameron and the family of Nancy Machiko Cameron, to remember and recognize her meaningful support for Nikkei Place with the unveiling of her beloved bench plaque and newly planted Osakazuki Japanese Maple tree.

With a modern splash of colour, Tokyo-born, Vancouver-based artist, Taka Sudo was commissioned to create a large-scale mural on the east Magnolia Lane pathway wall featuring two Red Crowned Cranes framed by traditional Japanese patterns. The design reflects Japanese cultural symbolism, invoking themes of happiness, good luck, family, and longevity, while representing the connection between Japan and Canada that we foster at the NNMCC.

After more than 16 years with the NNMCC, Linda Kawamoto Reid, retired from her role as Research Archivist, one she held as a volunteer, contractor, and highly valued employee. Linda has helped so many families, and researchers, dig deeply into the NNMCC archives, discover the past, and share our ancestral stories. We are eternally grateful for her enduring dedication as the Chair of the Japanese Canadian War Memorial Committee. As our new Research Archivist, Daien Ide returned to NNMCC, after nearly 20 years, in part with support from JCLS through our Heritage Hub Project (The Hub). In addition, JCLS funding through The Hub project has supported the Collections Team, including partial funding of the Collections Manager, along with new long-term contracted Librarian and Collections Assistant positions.

A special thanks to our building advisors – Frank Kamiya, Henry Wakabayashi, George Honkawa, Ken Takeuchi, and the late, Ian Miki – a true inspiration and driving force behind many initiatives at the NNMCC.

I wish to share my sincere condolences with lan's family for their loss. Let us honour him in our work this year, and remember his encouragement, enthusiasm, and community spirit.

We are lucky to have such a gorgeous and flourishing garden to enjoy, thanks to the VJGA, and weekly care by the Usuda family of Kyoto Garden Landscaping. I hope that you will pause for a moment of tranquillity in the Nikkei Garden when you visit next. We look forward to welcoming you this year at the NNMCC and working together to celebrate our upcoming 25th anniversary in 2025.

President's Report

As President of the Nikkei National Museum & Cultural Centre, I have the honour of once again addressing this annual President's Report to you, our valued members. However, it is with a heavy heart that I take this opportunity to remember my late fellow Director and friend, Ian Miki, who sadly passed away on May 11, 2024, following a brave battle with lymphoma. Ian served as a Director for over ten years and was passionate about his family, and the NNMCC.

We remain steadfast in our commitment to advancing the NNMCC's mission: To honour, preserve and share the history and heritage of Japanese Canadians and Japanese culture in Canada. Our expertise in digitization and curation of archival materials is critical to our mission. This expertise and the National Japanese Canadian Digitization Strategy¹ inform our approach to build the Digital Database Hub and Heritage Portal, which is being funded through B.C. Redress under the auspices of the Japanese Canadian Legacies Society.

Sherri Kajiwara, Director-Curator, with the support of her skilled and dedicated team, has continued to work hard to enhance the museum's profile and well-earned reputation not only in Canada but also abroad – most recently in Japan, where the *Broken Promises* travelling exhibit continues to attract much interest. Of note, Sherri is Chair of the Museum Exhibit Cluster, and Lisa Uyeda, Collections Manager is co-chair of the Archives Cluster of *Past Wrongs*, *Future Choices*, an ambitious multi-year, multinational research and educational project that includes over 100 members on five continents, and involves 40 institutions, including the NNMCC, the Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre and the University of Victoria (which serves as the project's home base). *Past Wrongs*, *Future Choices* follows on the success of the University of Victoria-led *Landscapes of Injustice* project in which the NNMCC was a significant partner. Sherri is much sought-after as a speaker and panelist both in Canada and abroad.

Throughout the past year, the NNMCC has remained a focal point for Japanese culture in the Lower Mainland. Favourites such as the Nikkei Craft Fair, Mochitsuki, and Farmers Markets continue to attract enthusiastic and diverse patrons, and the 12th annual Nikkei Matsuri Festival will once again bring excitement to Nikkei Place with one of Canada's largest authentic and family-friendly Japanese festivals. Special thanks once again to Louise Akuzawa, Chair of the Nikkei Matsuri Organization Committee, for her leadership in organizing this very successful event, and to the other members of the Committee on our Board – namely, Wakako Morris, Ron Kruschen and Cheryl Honkawa, and the approximately 300 volunteers and staff who make the festival a success each year.

Under the leadership of Carrie Okano, Director, we have renewed commitment to participate meaningfully as a member organization of the National Association of Japanese Canadians.

Governance

Our current Board of Directors held its first meeting immediately following our last annual general meeting and has continued to meet bi-monthly. The Executive Committee has continued to meet monthly. Meetings of the Finance Committee, the Fundraising Committee, the Governance Committee and the Communications Committee have been held on an as-required basis.

The National Japanese Canadian Digitization Strategy was developed in collaboration with the Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre, and supported by funding from the Government of Canada. 



Collections & Archives





We are home to the largest community-driven repository of Japanese Canadian history in Canada. By acquiring, preserving, and making accessible archival records, artwork, and personal belongings related to Japanese Canadian heritage, we offer an important resource for all to learn about Japanese Canadians' place in our country's history.

The Collections Team actively preserves:

- 59,500+ photographs and digital images
- 54.6+ metres of textual records
- 1500+ library books
- 677+ oral history records
- 191 film reels
- 3,225+ artworks and objects

We accepted many new donations this year and each donation ranges from one item to hundreds and may include documents, photographs, books, maps, artwork, films, oral histories, and objects. This year we accepted 80 new donations and accruals including 4.6+ metres of textual records, 7,000 photographs, 230+ books, 226+ objects and artworks, and more!



Dr. Shuichi Kusaka was an accomplished theoretical physicist and colleague of Dr. Oppenheimer and Albert Einstein. This year, Megan Koyanagi (Collections Assistant) with support from the Kusaka family processed and digitized part of the Dr Shuichi Kusaka collection.

We host the national Japanese Canadian online database and this year, we had 1,671 visitors (29,593 visitor hits) explore our 643 collections and 40,812 items.

Japanese Canadian Mobile Digitization Project

Developed three travelling digitization kits to support capacity building in the Japanese Canadian community, to make more materials accessible in a digital format, thanks to the Government of Canada Museum Assistance Program.

Staff facilitate access to rare and one of a kind resources in the library, archives, and museum collections. Our services include object loans, onsite filming and photography of objects, high resolution digitized reproductions, remote and onsite research & genealogy support, and commercial licensing.

- 534 research inquiries (almost two times more than the previous year)
- 650+ hours were spent helping researchers
- 121 in person visits (23%), up 50 visits from the previous year
- 413 remote inquiries by phone, email, and video calls (77%)
- 31 tours of the Resource Centre and Archives



Museum Programs

Internment Bus Tour

Returning in July for the first time since 2019, the tour journeyed through Japanese Canadian internment sites and Nikkei communities across British Columbia. Participants, including guests from the University of Victoria summer school, embarked on a profound journey, delving into the complex narratives of resilience, injustice, and community strength woven into these historical sites. Through guided exploration and insightful commentary, attendees gained a deeper understanding of the impact of internment on individuals and communities.



Remembrance Day Ceremony

The annual ceremony on November 11, held at the Japanese Canadian War Memorial in Stanley Park and live-streamed, paid homage to the Japanese Canadian soldiers who fought for Canada. This year marked a significant return, as the reception at the Vancouver Rowing Club was reinstated for the first time since 2019. This provided attendees with a meaningful space to come together and reflect on the sacrifices and achievements of those who served, fostering a sense of unity and remembrance within the community.



Book launches

NNMCC hosted two book launches: On June 8, "Atomweight" by Emi Sasagawa was introduced, presenting a compelling coming-of-age narrative centred on a mixed-race immigrant woman navigating her identity. Then, on October 22, "Obaasan's Boots," authored by cousins Lara Jean Okihiro and Janis Bridger, was unveiled. Based on the true story of their Japanese Canadian grandparents, who, along with 22,000 others, were forcibly relocated to internment camps in 1942, this book offers a poignant reflection on history for young readers.

In-Person Field Trip Programs

 Approximately 1,445 students, teachers, and groups visited for in-person field trips.

JOURNEYS Digital Resources

 Approximately 288 students in 14 schools and homeschools benefited from the kits. Accessibility outside the Lower Mainland increased with kits travelling to Fort St. Johns and various locations in the Lower Mainland.

Manga Camps

- **58** children ages 9-12 participated in 4 Manga Camp sessions in July.

Museum Shop

The museum shop operates as a social enterprise, generating revenue to support our programs and initiatives, while also serving as a platform to showcase Nikkei history and Japanese cultural heritage to our visitors. Offering a curated selection of items imported from Japan, such as Musubi brand furoshiki, Kaya Kaya pottery, and incense, the shop provides an immersive experience that connects visitors with the rich traditions of Japanese culture. Additionally, our selection of museum publications such as Karizumai, Departures, and Taiken, along with Asahi hats and t-shirts, reinforces our commitment to preserving and sharing Nikkei history. Recent additions to our shop merchandise include rare used Japanese Canadian books sourced from museum collection donations and plushies from the popular brand Jellycat. We also began incorporating donated vintage home goods into our inventory such as handcrafted kokeshi dolls. Notably, shop sales experience significant boosts during special events.



Museum Outreach

Learning exchanges

For professional development we offer tours to other museum professionals and also tour other institutions when time permits. Staff of the new Chinese Canadian Museum visited us in April in advance of their official opening. NNMCC Staff visited the UBC Residential School History and Dialogue Centre for a tour in November.




Past Wrongs Future Choices

Past Wrongs Future Choices (PWFC)

Starting in May 2022, Past Wrongs Future Choices continues on the foundational work of Landscapes of Injustice (LOI), a SSHRCC funded research & public history project that investigated the mass forced dispossession of Japanese Canadians in the 1940s. PWFC analyzes the treatment of racially Japanese in Allied Countries in the wake of the Second World War. NNMCC is one of several national and international partners with Lisa Uyeda, Collections Manager, and Sherri Kajiwara DirectorlCurator, taking on project cluster lead roles. Due to the global nature of the partnership, most meetings take place online, but in April 2023, project leads Drs. Jordan Stanger-Ross and Audrey Kobayashi, with Exhibitions Cluster Chair Sherri Kajiwara, visited partners at Los Angeles, USA and São Paulo, Brazil in April 2023 for in-person meetings to support project progress. Other in-person activity included artist + scholar residency meetings at UVic in May, an orientation day at the NNMCC for UVic field school participants before the internment camp bus tour in July, and a meeting with institutional partner the Royal British Columbia Museum in October regarding potential interventions in their permanent displays. The curatorial team for Broken Promises, the capstone exhibition of LOI, came together for a full day workshop at the NNMCC in January 2024 to review exhibit development for an academic paper led by Ph.D candidate Kaitlin Findlay and Drs. Tevor Wideman and Yasmin Amarutunga.

Publications



Stories of My People

Stories of My People by Roy Ito, originally published in 1994, is now available for free download as an e-book. It serves as a valuable record of the contributions and stories of Japanese Canadians, intertwining community experiences with personal narratives, but was challenging to access due to being out of print. In response to a request from Roy Ito's family, the NNMCC produced a digital epub format to reach a wider audience and assist researchers.

Nikkei Images

Nikkei Images is a publication that offers a rich exploration of the history, experiences, and contributions of ethnic Japanese in Canada. While multiple issues were published annually in the past, our current goal is to release one issue per year. One issue was published with an article exploring the first Japanese immigrant in Canada.

Special Events

O-Hanami Festival celebrates spring Japanese style

On April 1, we celebrated Japanese culture with a spring-themed O-Hanami festival – our first full-scale event since the COVID-19 pandemic. The festival featured 8 stage performances, including the samurai troupe Hitotose. Attendees delighted in activities such as kimono rentals and tea ceremony workshops. The event showcased 12 food vendors and 9 craft vendors, with over 100 Sakura Bento and 100 packs of Manju sold. Attendance: 3,000.

A Tribute to Mitsuo and Emmie Hayashi

On May 6, 2023 a commemorative event was held in honour of Mitsuo and Emmie Hayashi. The couple was known for their tireless efforts to build strong relations between Canada and Japan, as well as their dedication to the Nikkei Place community since the 1990s. To honour their legacy, the event hall was renamed the Mitsuo and Emmie Hayashi Hall. About 50 attendees, including volunteers, Board Directors, Auxiliary, Consulate General of Japan in Vancouver, and friends, gathered to pay tribute.

Spring Bazaar enchants visitors with Japanese delights

On May 13, the annual Spring Bazaar returned for the first time since 2019. NNMCC Auxiliary members prepared and sold a variety of their staple recipes, attracting a massive lineup of people that extended from the street, through the garden, and into the lobby. Additionally, the Auxiliary members priced and sold many Japanese items donated for the flea market, resulting in an extraordinary assortment of goods accumulated over the pandemic years. Attendance: 2,000.







Nikkei Garden Farmers Market fosters meaningful connections

For the 3rd season, Nikkei Garden Farmers Markets took place twice a month from June to October. Each market presented an average of 34 vendors and attracted around 1,000 guests. A variety of cultural experiences were introduced at each market – from performances by groups such as Vancouver Okinawa Taiko and Appare Yosakoi Vancouver to interactive workshops like origami and manju making. We were also pleased to foster meaningful connections with local organisations by hosting community tents, welcoming partners such as the Burnaby Art Gallery, Burnaby Hospice Society, BC SPCA Burnaby, HK House, Burnaby Pride, and more. Attendance over 10 markets: 10,000.

Tanabata Flea Market offers cultural shopping experience

The annual Tanabata Flea Market took place in tandem with the Nikkei Garden Farmers Markets in mid July. It included a festive Tanabata display by KPU Japan Club students, and visitors could write their wish on Tanzaku.

The event showcased a wide range of attractions and activities, including traditional performances, cultural demonstrations, delicious food, children's games, and Japan-themed markets, offering attendees a thorough immersion into Japanese culture.

A standout highlight was the performance by samurai artists Kamui from Japan. Additionally, the introduction of Zenyasai, a festival-eve celebration, proved to be a fantastic addition, attracting young adults. The return of the Talent Search competition after a three-year hiatus was also noteworthy, spotlighting emerging artists and performers and further enriching the Matsuri experience. This is our largest event and fundraiser of the year, where all staff work alongside volunteer committee members and hundreds of event volunteers to make it possible. We look forward to continuing this tradition of celebration in the years ahead, with gratitude to our partners, volunteers, and supporters. Attendees over 3 days: 9,000.

Wagashi Master Eijun Mitsubori performed a demonstration of traditional Japanese sweet-making, Dojin Arts provided matcha tea service with fresh manju made by NNMCC Auxiliary members. Kado Sumi's seasonal ikebana flower arrangements added a visual feast to the occasion, while Kotononekai's live koto music provided ambience. Through Nikkei Place Foundation's fundraising initiatives, we raised funds to make admission to the Karasawa Gallery by donation, changing from the previous \$5 admission fee, thereby bringing more cultural experiences to our community. Craft Fair celebrates local makers

On November 18 and 19, the annual Craft Fair brought together 80 local makers, attracting an estimated 1,500 guests over the two days. Ikebana, Temari, and Chigirie workshops were also offered to celebrate handmade culture.



Breakfast with Santa made special by Nikkei elves

On December 9, the annual Breakfast with Santa served families (120 adults and children) a pancake breakfast, and children went home with goodie bags handmade by NNMCC Auxiliary members.

Nikkei Mochitsuki pounds community together

On December 29, the annual Mochitsuki event was held in collaboration with the Vancouver Japanese Gardeners Association and the NNMCC Auxiliary. There were long line ups to purchase fresh and frozen mochi. Highlights included mochi pounding demonstrations and the popular "Pound Your Own Mochi" activity. Stage performances featured Chibi Taiko, Satsukikai, and Vancouver Okinawa Taiko. 9 food and drink vendors joined the event. CBC covered the event with an interview and live TV broadcast.

Shared concept of New Year brings people together

The New Year's Calligraphy Kakizome drop-in program on January 6 attracted around 200 diverse attendees to write new year's wishes and intentions. Consul General Maruyama Kohei demonstrated various calligraphy styles. The event was covered live on Global TV's noon newscast.

Special Project



Mural enhances our presence in Burnaby

NNMCC commissioned Tokyo-born, Vancouver-based artist Taka Sudo to create a mural that enhances the Centre's cultural identity and celebrates Japanese heritage. This mural combines vibrant colours and dynamic imagery, featuring a custom-designed two-panel Red-Crowned Crane (tanchōzuru), seigaiha waves symbolizing peace and resilience, and kasumi mist evoking a sense of mystique. Reflecting Japanese cultural symbolism, it invokes themes of happiness, good luck, family, and longevity. The Red-Crowned Crane, native to Kushiro, Japan, Burnaby's sister city, underscores the bond between the two nations and celebrates their shared values.



Outreach



West Vancouver Community Cultural Fest

June 2-3, 2023

This two-day festival in West Vancouver unites people through food, music, and culture, celebrating multicultural diversity. NNMCC hosted the Japanese pavilion, offering cultural activities and enhancing understanding of Japan's rich heritage.

Hats Off Day

June 3, 2023

This two-kilometre street party in North Burnaby features live entertainment, street food, activities, and showcases from local businesses and organizations. For the first time, NNMCC set up a tent to promote and deepen engagement within the Burnaby community.

Daisy Days

June 17-18, 2023

Organized by our membership program partner Studio Brewing, Daisy Days was a lively block party aimed at fostering community spirit and providing a fun environment for residents to connect. Our participation offered an opportunity to engage with the local community, promote our programming, and contribute to Burnaby's vibrant cultural scene.

Powell Street Festival

August 5-6, 2023

Held annually in Vancouver, the Powell Street Festival is our main outreach activity with a long history of celebrating Japanese Canadian arts, culture, and heritage through diverse performances, exhibits, and community activities. NNMCC shared a tent with H.U.G.S. (Health Urgent Guide Services for Japanese Canadian Survivors in the Lower Mainland of B.C.), offering the opportunity to connect with a diverse, international audience passionate about Japanese culture and Nikkei history.

Programs

Cultural Programs

Cultural programs, facilitated by NNMCC staff designed to promote Japanese culture, were held in collaboration with special events as well as standalone programs. Regular programs such as Kizuna Japanese Arts and Shogi Meetups were offered as drop-in programs for easy access. Workshops on Bonsai, Ikebana, Kengido, Temari, and Tea Ceremony were presented intermittently. The high demand for these programs, evidenced by many selling out, underscores the community's eagerness for more cultural programming.



Nikkei Japanese Bookstore



We operate a Japanese used bookstore as a community oriented venture. Approximately 15 dedicated volunteers, including long-standing members who have been with us since the bookstore's inception, work shifts to operate the store four days a week. The little bookstore appeals to a wide age range from children to adults, and attracts many visitors especially when special events take place. Despite offering a selection consisting exclusively of Japanese-language books, the store remains popular among English speakers who cannot read Japanese.

Approximately 400 volunteers contributed an impressive 14,000 hours of service. Their dedication and expertise have significantly elevated our activities, making it possible to host large-scale events that have a profound impact on our community. Diverse Volunteer Engagement

Thanks to two daily gallery monitoring volunteers, we were able to expand the Superlative Artistry of Japan exhibit into the Intergenerational Room in addition to the Karasawa Gallery for three months.

Seasonal lobby displays are a volunteer-driven effort. Before Christmas, volunteers decorated Christmas trees around the building. And leading up to Hina Matsuri in March, volunteers displayed numerous Japanese dolls, creating a festive atmosphere for visitors.

The Nikkei Matsuri, our largest annual event, is a prime example of volunteer excellence. With approximately 400 volunteer shifts, their contributions were vital to the festival's vibrant atmosphere and smooth execution over three days.

Intergenerational and Multicultural Volunteerism

Volunteers span a wide range of age groups, bringing unique perspectives and experiences. Senior volunteers, particularly those from the Auxiliary, are invaluable, offering a wealth of knowledge from which younger volunteers can learn. Additionally, many newcomers from Japan are finding their footing in Canada by volunteering here. This helps them integrate into Canadian life and build connections with Japanese Canadians and people from diverse backgrounds.

Mochitsuki, held at the year-end, was another busy and fun-filled event, providing great entertainment for all ages. Mochi sold as fast as it could be plated.

With the funds raised throughout the year, the Auxiliary was able to support annual educational and cultural programming and purchase two new stoves, three mochi machines, and a new microwave for the Community Kitchen. These items will benefit NNMCC and the Auxiliary for years to come.


